## *Spotlight on ...*

### *Kurt Mohr, AmeriCorps Member IYC-Warrenville*

“I joined AmeriCorps on September 1st after serving as a tutor at IYC-Warrenville for almost a year. I began tutoring because I was retired, with way too much time on my hands. Not having kids of my own, I really wanted to work with youth. I started volunteering a couple of hours per week, but found I really enjoyed the interaction with the students and my time at the center. I’ve gradually increased my hours and am now tutoring about 10 hours per week.

In the spring, we experienced a 3-month COVID lockdown during which we weren’t able to tutor. In our absence, I wondered and worried about our students. I knew the lockdown would limit their outside contact even more. I was thrilled in June when we were able to resume tutoring. There had been quite a bit of student turnover, but I was most surprised by the mood at the center. Our students seemed to have matured. They were more willing to engage, took their work more seriously, and generally seemed to appreciate the renewed contact. I felt the same.

I usually tutor math and science, although I help wherever needed. Math was always particularly difficult for me in school and I went to college ill-prepared for the math requirements of my chemistry major. I started in remedial algebra and took classes every semester (some of them twice). Because it was so difficult for me, I can often understand where our students have problems... the same places I did. Most of my teachers would be amused to think of me tutoring math.

In the last few months, my hours at Warrenville have become a high point of my week. I find the 1:1 interaction with the students so rewarding, especially when they suddenly understand something they didn’t before. And every day when I leave, I feel a little younger than when I walked in. I look forward to many more hours of tutoring at Warrenville.”



#### **Interested in a Fuller Volunteer Experience ?**

Intrigued with Kurt’s AmeriCorps service ? Enjoy working with the youth and have some extra time to spare? Join with him and become a member of LVI’s VOCAL\* AmeriCorps Program. The central goal of the – Volunteer Outreach for Community Action in Literacy – program is to expand literacy services to at-risk populations by engaging individuals to serve as tutors and volunteer recruiters in community-based literacy programs, of which Jump Start is one.



LVI offers various opportunities for AmeriCorps service from minimum-time of 6-8 hours a week to a full-time commitment of 35 hours a week. A monthly stipend ranging from \$200 to \$1,200 is provided, along with an education award at the end of service ranging from \$1,300 to \$6,195. The award can be used to pay student loans or future tuition. A bonus - individuals over the age of 55 can transfer the award to a child or grandchild. # News from the Centers ...



## **Greetings from St. Charles IYC and Samuel Sublett Alternative High School**

Despite the pandemic, our school is managing to get quite a lot accomplished. In honor of Suicide Prevention Awareness Month, our Lake Land College Horticulture teacher, Ms. Smith, facilitated the planting of two beautiful chrysanthemums near the gazebo outside our school, and a brief poetry service was held.

An Information Technology Pilot Program was recently offered twice a week for six weeks. The Program introduced the appropriate use of social media and how to create letters, resumes, and presentation materials. The capstone project allowed students to create their own websites. The program was presented by the School Office Coordinator, Mr. Tolkson; three students were given certificates of completion.

School staff, mainly our teacher Mr. Hentschel, presented several sessions on Civics, culminating with a mock election, held on Friday, October 30th from 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. The polling place was the school library. Registration in advance of “election day” was offered and youth who were released were able to send in absentee ballots! Onsite registration was also offered and voting privileges were also offered to staff. The results mirrored those at the national level: Joe Biden was the winner.

For Hispanic Awareness Month, which runs September 15<sup>th</sup> – October 16<sup>th</sup>, we enjoyed some authentic Mexican food prepared by the mother of our principal, Mr. Zarco, along with an array of Mexican candy and treats purchased by LVI. Program Assistant Danielle Johnson provided an art activity to go along with the delicious brunch.



For the Thanksgiving Holiday, we held an essay contest, asking students to write about what they were thankful for and why. More information plus the winning entry is included on page ...

The STC Jump Start program was invited to participate in a book club/focus group offered by Liberation Library, a not-for-profit which provides books to incarcerated youth. Participating youth have been asked to read the book *All American Boys* by Frank Kusch (provided by Liberation Library), participate in an online discussion session and then write something about the book for the Liberation Library newsletter. If they complete all three steps, they will receive a week of “cut time,” meaning a one-week reduction of their sentence, so that is quite an incentive, as you might imagine.

A December book club sponsored by BreakFree Education – a national organization that provides resources and programming to juvenile justice agencies to make school relevant and meaningful - will give students the opportunity to read and discuss the book *Long Way Down*, by Jason Reynolds.

The census in St. Charles has been just under 40, with less than 10 students in school. Sadly, we have had numerous cases of COVID-19, but none have been among the Education Staff. Jump Start staff is currently working part-time in the school and part-time remotely.

Even though these are trying times, 16 STC students have passed the GED since August 1, so progress is being made. Jump Start has been assisting with a lot of GED prep!

Last but not least, Jump Start has been assisting with a class offered by Northwestern University more on that to follow in the next edition of Eye on YIC.

## **IYC-Chicago Tutor Recognized with a Governor's Service Award**



Kudos to tutor Scott Milliman who was featured in the Volunteer Spotlight in our last edition of *Eye on IYC*: Scott was recognized in September with one of the Governor's Service Awards. He was nominated for the award by former program coordinator Alex Dunbar, who in introducing Scott in the virtual ceremony held on September 16<sup>th</sup> said in his video message - "It is the mark of the man that he would say that he was the fortunate one to have had this opportunity, but I can assure you that it's the kids and staff that Scott works with who feel particularly blessed. He's ignited hope, belief and optimism in the lives of so many kids and opened their eyes to opportunities they didn't even know existed, that we are the richer for having known him." The Governor's Service Awards is an annual activity of the Serve Illinois Commission that recognizes the outstanding efforts of volunteers in six categories – Adult, Senior Corps, AmeriCorps, Senior Citizen, Youth and Business in five regions of the state.

## **Hello from Harrisburg !**

Things have been busy at Booker T. Washington Alternative High School. On the anniversary of 9/11, our students watched the movie "Boat Lift" and "9/11 Emergency Room" and were very impressed. Sadly, in September we had two staff members and one youth test positive for COVID-19, so we had to take extra precautions to prevent it from spreading.

In honor of Suicide Awareness Month students planted a tree and several shared poems they had written. For Hispanic Heritage Month our youth decorated the school with artwork celebrating the Day of the Dead and a Spanish Dominoes Tournament was held. We had several other activities for staff members, including a Boss's Day luncheon for our principal, Jamie Rheaume, a retirement party for a staff member and our regular monthly birthday luncheons. The daily census for our Center has been hovering around 40 youth with about 22 students enrolled in school. As I write this, we are holding school as usual.

## **Warrenville Focuses on the Constitution**

At IYC-Warrenville, LVI Jump Start is responsible for preparing youth for the US Constitution which includes the Flag Code, and the Illinois Constitution. One student thanked the tutors for "their patience" and said he appreciated the fact that we "kept pushing him to work harder". He described his tutors as both "determined and optimistic". Our reward was the student put forth his very best and reached his goal of passing the Constitution! Another student was also very grateful to the Jump Start tutors for helping her pass the Constitution test. Her parting comments on an Exit Interview we do with our students said, "I would not have accomplished my GED without your help". And added, "thank-you for all the pick me ups when I was down and wanting to give up". This type of feedback is why we are committed to the work we do at IYC-Warrenville. We feel honored to be a part of youth's education.

# *Saluting Our Military Veterans*

On Tuesday, November 10<sup>th</sup>, IYC-Warrenville's Jump Start Coordinator, Teresa Urfer, and AmeriCorps member, Kurt Mohr helped facilitate a program honoring the veterans who work at the Center. The program was attended by the school's graduates, teachers and administrators. Four veterans, two men and two women, shared a variety of stories. One veteran spoke about his experience working on a submarine and the skills that he learned. Another spoke about the racism she encountered, but how in spite of that hardship her time in the military taught her discipline and put her on a more positive path. They all talked about the lifelong friends they made and their gratitude for seeing other parts of the country and the world. Another big plus was money for education through the GI Bill.

After the veterans spoke, Superintendent Mr. Ibrahim and Assistant Superintendent Ms. Alexander talked to the youth about considering the opportunities military service has to offer and the benefits of military service when seeking a state job.

LVI played a prominent role in the program, from initiating the idea to providing a beautifully decorated cake, as well as setting up and cleaning up afterwards. Judging from the feedback, the program was a memorable event !

AmeriCorps member Kurt Mohr had this to say about the program: "My main takeaway from all of the veteran speakers was how positively they viewed their experiences. Despite the challenges and hardships they described, they all indicated that their personal growth was worth the cost and difficulty. They seemed to value this over the other benefits, such as education, pay and veterans programs. As each spoke, their confidence and self-discipline confirmed their personal growth and how much they had changed from how they described their pre-service lives."

Over at IYC-St. Charles, Program Assistant Danielle Johnson facilitated a Veteran's Day Program featuring one of their very own security supervisors, Mr. E. Williams, who showed photographs from his time in Iraq and spoke with students about his experiences in the military.

LVI's AmeriCorps members at other locations also participated in a bevy of Veteran's Day activities from writing letters of thanks to hospitalized vets and those currently serving in war zones abroad, to participating in the virtual opening of the National Native American Veterans Memorial, which is the first National Memorial acknowledging American Indians who served in the armed forces and dedicated themselves to defending our nation.

While Jump Start did not provide Veterans Day programming at IYC-Harrisburg, Larry Durfee, Jump Start program coordinator, is a proud veteran who we salute for his military service.

*Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on November 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. This date was chosen in honor of the "eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month" of 1918, which signaled the end of the war Congress passed a resolution in 1926 to make the day an annual observance and in 1938 it was made a national holiday. In 1954 President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation to change the name from Armistice Day to Veterans Day to honor all those who served the country in war or peace. Unlike Memorial Day, Veterans Day pays tribute to all American veterans - living or dead - but provides us with the opportunity to recognize especially the valor of those living.*

## **What Are You Thankful For and Why? - St. Charles Essay Contest**

To help get students in the spirit of the holidays and to improve their writing in the process, a Thanksgiving themed writing contest was held at IYC-STC during the month of November. Students were asked to write an essay, of at least 8 lines, responding to the prompt: “What are you thankful for and why?” Six students submitted essays for the contest. Essays were rated by four judges based on content, spelling and grammar, and neatness of handwriting. All youth who entered received a certificate and a candy bar and the winner received a special lunch from McDonalds. All essays were excellent, but there could only be one winner.

*I'm thankful for many things. I'm most thankful for the people in my life who've refused to give up on me despite my insubordination. Who've continued to support me even after I've gave them every reason not to. I'm thankful that they didn't give up on me even when I gave up on myself. Weirdly enough, I'm also thankful for my past and rough childhood. Even though I've missed out on some prime times in my life, I've experienced firsthand reasons why you shouldn't do certain things. I know it might sound funny, but my experiences now, that I've learned from are far less severe from the ones I probably would have had if I didn't learn from the ones I had earlier in life.*

*I'm also thankful for people who's lives aren't as easy as mine, because when I look at them and look at me, it helps me realize that things could be worse and I'm thankful that they're not. I'm also thankful for everyone who showed me who I don't want to be. I'm especially thankful to be alive even after all the time I have put myself in situations for me to have my life taken from me. I'm also really thankful that the people and environment I grew up around raised me to be so understanding and humble because out of my 18 years of living I've noticed that being humble is one of the best things you can be. I love that sometimes their answers are earnest and hopeful. I imagine that their lives might not often feel that way.

I still have a lot to learn but I'm grateful for the opportunity and look forward to lots of tutoring ahead.




### **Nina Massion, IYC-St. Charles**
